



What an exciting event at an awesome venue! On Saturday 29th June, we entered a team from Lealands High School, into a competition to construct and compete with a radio controlled chariot at the Leonardo Luton 2024 Rampaging Chariots tournament.



Each summer, Leonardo hosts a series of Robotic Games across its UK sites. Originally held in Edinburgh in 2006, the games encourage problem-solving, creativity and camaraderie in teams of aspiring engineers.

Working with Rampaging Chariots, the games see young people testing their powerful and lightweight robots in a series of challenges.

Participation in the Robotic Games provides an excellent engineering challenge which can inspire participating students about Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) through:

- Design and technology
- Wood and metal working skills
- Basic electronic engineering
- Electrical skills
- Radio control

The Rampaging Chariot is a radio controlled robot built from a kit provided by Leonardo, which is then modified and improved upon by schools and youth groups. The kits were created by Leonardo engineer and famous test pilot, Peter Bennett, who designed and built the Typhoon robots featured on the television programme Robot Wars - winning many awards along the way.

Course: Andreea, Leah, Dumitru, Ibrahim, Kyle, Abrar and Ciaran.

We had to construct our chariot using the given kit and instructions, and then compete in four thrilling events: sumo, tug of war, obstacle course, and football match. We were going up against several competing schools, each with their own talented teams of engineering design students.



The key strategies were:

- 1. Start early we have 12 hours to build our chariot, so we had to plan and start building as soon as our kit was delivered.
- 2. Design for flexibility consider building a modular design that allowed us to adjust or needed replace parts during the competition.
- **3. Practice communication** as a team we had working together practise and communicating effectively the during competition.
- **4. Be creative** we had to think outside the box and come up with innovative solutions to problems we may have encountered during the competition.

Our team was awarded the best newcomer award. We were fully invested in our entry. Leah designed and built the chassis of the chariot as well as the design of our team t-shirts and matching tote bags.

Andreea worked under the supervision of Mr Donkor to put together the electronics as well








as having designed the logo licence plate used on the chariot and the merchandise. 3D and textile printing of team merchandise was courtesy of Mr Butterfield.

Dumitru led the rest of the team with fitting the components to the chassis.



For those hoping to get involved in this competition next year, here's a breakdown of the competition schedule and rules for each event:

#### **Event 1: Sumo**

- Objective: Design a chariot that can withstand collisions with other chariots without compromising its structural integrity.
- Rules: Each team will pair up against another team in a sumo-style competition. The last chariot standing wins.

#### **Event 2: Tug of War**

- Objective: Design a chariot that can pull a weight or another chariot across a designated distance.
- Rules: Teams will be divided into pairs and compete in a tug-of-war competition. The team that pulls the most distance or pulls the other chariot across the finish line wins.



#### **Event 3: Obstacle Course**

- Objective: Design a chariot that can navigate an obstacle course efficiently and quickly.
- Rules: Teams will send their chariots through an obstacle course, and the fastest time wins.

#### **Event 4: Football Match**

- Objective: Design a chariot that can move and control on a football field while scoring goals.
- Rules: Teams will play a game of radio-controlled football, with goals at each end of the field. The team that scores the most goals wins.

We are really looking forward to taking the knowledge from this year and being the team to watch out for next year!





10 Year 9 students completed their DofE expedition in the most testing of conditions recently. They had to endure temperatures of over 30 degrees whilst carrying heavy rucksacks....and getting lost!

Their journey started at the beginning of the year when they signed up for the internationally recognized qualification. They had to complete 3 other sections before being let loose in the great outdoors. Skill, Physical and Volunteering make up the other mandatory components of the Award. Our students were asked to reflect on what they did and how this made them feel.

Charlie said that, 'DofE means to me, to become a better person and to become a better influence on others'. He played piano for his skill section, developed his fitness for his physical section and helped an elderly family friend for his volunteering section.

#### YEAR 10 BARNFIELD VISIT






